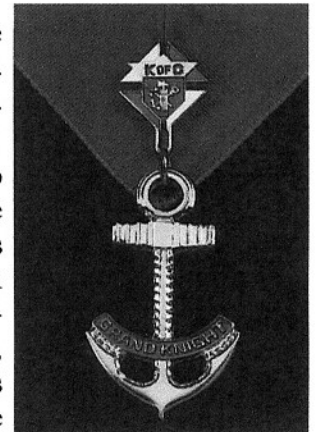
Recently, the City Council of San Francisco issued a Proclamation denouncing the actions of the Catholic Church in voicing its opinion on the adoption of children by same sex couples.

## Columbian Club News by Rich Morano

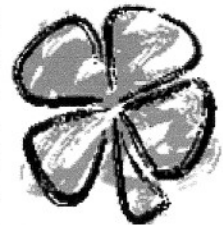

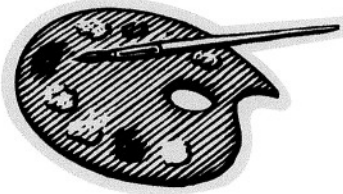
I would again like to thank all my officers for their loyalty and dedication to the Council and the Order.

A week later, on Saturday, February 28, the Knights will hold a live auction of fine

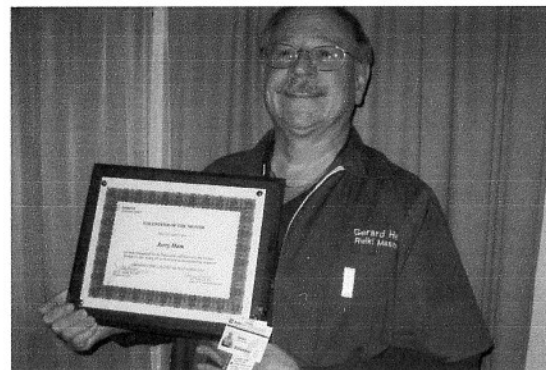

## Council History by Spencer W. Purdum, PGK, FDD

In previous history columns, I have touched on the roll of agriculture and industry in the lives of our early members, and I have given capsule biographies of two of our more important charter members, Michael H. Collins and Charles S. H. Mount. Now I would like to take on an entire family, the McCues.

Now the McCues apparently did not exercise much leadership in the Knights, though two of them were charter members. The family was prosperous, however, owning or operating six farms in Marlboro and Atlantic Townships. And they were very numerous. My index of items from the Monmouth Democrat includes references to 108 different McCues.

Their story begins with four men, Charles, John, Patrick and Martin. All came to the United States from Ireland in the late 1840's or early 1850's. I suspect, but can not yet prove, that they were brothers. All were single when they came here, and all married women from the Freehold area.

Charles was the first to arrive, having married and settled here prior to 1860. He married Bridget, daughter of Patrick Collins of Marlboro. They would have eleven children, including Charter Member Joseph, their youngest, born in 1880. As an adult, Joseph would marry Margaret Slattery and become a brother in law of our charter members Charles S. H. Mount and Louis Thompson.

The other three arrived in this area during the 1860's. John, the youngest, married

Mary Martin. There was a William Martin among our charter members. John and Mary would have six children. His eldest son, Charles, would move to Lakewood and become a prominent horseman. His grandson was Dr. J. Wallace McCue of Matawan.

Patrick married Mary Cooney and had four children, the eldest of whom, Bridget would in 1885 marry charter member Michael H. Collins. The first Mrs. McCue died some time after 1870, and Patrick married Mary Queeney and had two more children. His youngest, Peter, born 1876 was the other charter McCue.

The eldest of the four, Martin, married Mary Conway. There was a James Conway among our charter members. They, too, would have ten children. His eldest son Patrick, would as an adult move to Shrewsbury and farm there. His second son, Martin, became a successful dairy farmer in Long Branch and was for several years Monmouth County Road Supervisor; and would marry the sister of charter member John Stapleton. His daughter Ella married a New York physician, Dr. Walter Gilday, while daughter Clara married Freehold funeral director William H. Freeman.

Other members of this extended family would marry into the Cahill, Cummings, Curley, Dugan, Ford, Gleason, Hardy, Kelsey, Maher, Preston and Rooney families.

It seems that a very sizeable percentage of our early members bear some relationship to the McCue family.
