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McGivney, assistant pastor of St. Mary's Church in New Haven and some of his parishioners, the Connecticut state legislature on March 29, 1882, officially chartered the Knights of Columbus as a fraternal benefit society. The Order is still true to its founding principles of charity, unity and fraternity.

Knighthood begins at a First Degree exemplification ceremony, by which a man joins the Order. He is then said to be a First Degree Knight of Columbus.

Thereafter by participating in the subsequent degrees, he attains the status of Sec-

ond and Third Degree Knight. The Third Degree Knight is considered a full member.

The Fourth Degree is the highest degree of the order. Members of this degree are addressed as "Sir Knight". The primary purpose of the 4thDegree is to foster the spirit of Patriotism and to encourage active Catholic Citizenship.

The Knights of Columbus has been "Making a Difference for Life" for more than 120 years. Let us continue making a difference and grow our council in this Columbian Year.

Our next First Degree ceremony is planned for Tuesday, October 26.

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mother; and another of an Irish father and a Scottish mother. The other 36 were Irish.

This is not an unusual arrangement: Both Long Branch Council (chartered 1898) and Asbury Park Council (chartered 1903) were also nearly entirely Irish.

What I am about to describe comes from the Federal Census of 1910, taken about thirty months before our Council was chartered.

Freehold, for a small, isolated town in the middle of a large agricultural area, was remarkably diverse. Its population included people of 25 different nationalities. In a town of less than 4,200 people, nearly 500 were not born in the United States. The major immigrant groups were the English (165), the Irish (134), the Russians (48), the Germans (41) and the Scots (41).

The English, Irish and Germans had been trickling into the area for sixty years. The Russian migration began in the 1890's. But most of the English and nearly all of the Scots were recruited by the Karagheusian Rug Mill, which opened in 1905. Unlike immigrants from other countries, the English and Scots immigrated as entire families not single refugees.

Recent immigrants were only a part of the story: there were over 700 second generation Americans among those 4,200 persons born in the United States but with at least one foreign born parent. And of those 700, about 450 had an Irish-born parent. So, more than one Freehold resident in six had Irish blood running in his/ her veins. 25 of our charter members fall in this category.

The Catholic population of Freehold was nearly entirely Irish. The parish had been formed to serve the Irish farming population spread out over a hundred square miles surrounding Freehold; later, more and more moved into or near the Borough. In 1910, there were a handful of Italians, Hispanics, Lithuanians, French, Poles and Slovenians who were probably largely Catholic. The

other groups were largely not. That's not to say, of course, that all of the Irish were Catholic. The potato famine of the 1840's and the economic havoc that it caused, starved out the Protestant as well as the Catholic. Still, the great majority of the Irish in Freehold were Catholic.

Besides sharing a common country of origin, our charter members tended to live in the same neighborhoods. About 200 lived in the West End—mostly on Bowne, Monmouth, Manalapan and Throckmorton. Another hundred clustered around St. Rose Church—McLean, Randolph, Lincoln and South. And fifty or so lived near the rug mill—Center, First, Ford, etc.

By 1910, most of the original potato famine immigrants—those who left Ireland in the mid-1840's—had passed away. But they left grandchildren, American born men and women with American born parents, the third generation Americans. Eleven of our charter members fell into this category.

Most of our charter members had deep roots in the Freehold area. Only two were themselves Irish born, and they had been in America for about twenty years. Two were born in Massachusetts and came here to work in the rug mill. Lastly, two were born in Connecticut but had lived in Freehold for almost twenty years. The remaining 34 were born here, a few having roots going back to the 1840's.

Even second and third generation Americans tended to marry within their ethnic group. It's not surprising, then to discover that many of our charter members were related to each other, not only as cousins, uncles and nephews, but also as in-laws. We had three father-son combinations and one pair of brothers among our charter members.

Is there any mystery then, how forty individuals were able to come together in the winter of 1913, and do the work necessary to charter a new Knights of Columbus Council?
