What it means to be a full Knight, a message to First Degree Knights:

As candidates we all begin by seeking admission into the order, representing ourselves as practical practicing catholic men over the age of eighteen years of age. We are willing to accept the principles Charity, Unity, Fraternity upon which our local council of the Knights of Columbus has been established. We pledged to ourselves that we will attain full knighthood

In the First Degree we learned that <u>Charity</u>: Is the love of man for his fellow man; an act of goodwill; benevolence; and giving of help to those in need; and that our Knights of Columbus council is here to help those less fortunate than ourselves

Once we had taken our First Degree we became a member in good standing in the Order. However To reach full Knighthood, we must also take the Second and Third Degrees. Brother Knights are strongly encouraged to do so

Herein lies the dilemma for some of our members: as members in good standing, they stopped the pursuit towards full Knighthood.

These "junior knights" satisfied themselves with the idea that the first degree was enough and denied themselves the opportunity to embrace the two remaining core values of the Knights, "Unity" and "Fraternity". These are the bonds that hold a council together. They began to treat the council as a "social stopover" and not a religious fraternal order dedicated to charity.

In the Second Degree brothers learned that

<u>Unity:</u> is the state of being one; united, oneness; continuity of purpose; and arrangement of parts that will produce a single harmonious effect. Unity also implies having common beliefs and supporting common cause.

"Unity" is demonstrated by the way the Knights work together to accomplish their many goals. The Knights of the council constantly work together to plan, coordinate and complete numerous fund raisers throughout the year. Their efforts are the key to the success of the council's ability to support various charitable causes and activities.

In the Third Degree brothers learned that <u>Fraternity:</u> is a fraternal relationship of brotherliness; a group of men joined together by a common interest for fellowship; a group of people with the same religious beliefs, and interest

"Fraternity" is the glue that makes the Knights' effective; it is also the source of a great many personal friendships. In this rushed and hectic world, it provides a feeling of belonging and friendship, frequently missing from much of our lives today. It also embraces family belonging.

There is no evinewspaper articles, census records and other documents, I've been able to piece together mini-biographies of many of them. But some of the stories will, after nearly a century, probably remain untold.

Our first Deputy Grand Knight was John He was one of only five charter Galvin. members not born within a few miles of Freehold. Born in 1868 in Massachusetts, he settled in Freehold in 1905 or 1906, thanks to the Karagheusian Rug Mill, where he was a weaver. He lived on Jackson Street with his wife and daughter. He succeeded our charter Grand Knight, Charles S. H. Mount, in 1915 and served one term, being succeeded by Joseph S. Murphy. In April, 1917, he transferred his membership to San Salvador Council 299 in Perth Amboy. The remainder of his life is unknown to us. It seems odd that one so high up in the early leadership would depart so quickly. Probably the prospects of a better job attracted him, though weavers at the rug mill made a good living at the time.

Our first Chancellor was William P. Kelly. Oddly enough, he was also born in Massachusetts, in 1883 and also came here as a carpet weaver in 1905 or 1906. He came here as a single man and lived in a boarding house on Hudson Street in 1910; but married not too long after. His son, William, Junior, was born just a month after the Council was chartered. In October, 1913, just eight months after taking his office, he

While he appardence that he was suspended from membership, but his name is not on the list of graves of members we decorate each Memorial Day. For a long time, I suspected that he too had left the area, but as it turns out he didn't: he died in 1943 and is buried at St. Rose; only the burial record is spelled "Kelley."

Also on the charter is the name Augustus A. Mooney. The mystery here is that no such person ever existed. He isn't found in newspapers, census records or parish records. That statement of course is a bit exaggerated, and the mystery is, I think, fairly easily solved. Our charter member, Michael C. Mooney had a son named Aloysius A. Mooney. He was born in Freehold in 1887, a date that corresponds with the Financial Secretary's record of Augustus. Aloysius' name is found in several censuses and newspaper articles. In 1917 he was drafted into the Army and rose to the rank of lieutenant. He apparently did not see combat and was mustered out in early 1919. He returned to Freehold briefly, but when his father died in October, 1919 he was living in He was eventually sus-New York City. pended from membership, though we don't know exactly when. Perhaps the discrepancy in names is the result of someone misreading someone else's horrible handwriting. Or maybe the member was known in some circles by his middle name. It's another question we're not likely to answer.
