CHAPLAIN'S MESSAGE - Deacon Drew Luhman

There are 2 great commandments from which the Decalogue, aka the 10 Commandments, hang. The first tells us that we are to love the Lord our God with all our hearts, all our souls and all our minds. The second teaches us that we are to love all our world-wide neighbors as we love ourselves WHILE TENDING TO THEIR NEEDS BEFORE OUR OWN, and all the time being non-judgmental towards all His children! Our Heavenly Father taught us that it is better to give than to receive; after all, didn't He send His Son to us so that we could be saved from the stain of Original Sin? That being said, we are sharing with you two commentaries about the birth of Jesus. The first can be found in a book entitled, Grace for the Moment book 2, ISBN 1-4041-0348-1, by Max Lucardo. "God Came Near": She looks into the face of the baby. Her Son. Her Lord. His Majesty. At this point in history, the human being who best understands who God is and what He is doing is a teenage girl in a smelly stable. She can't take her eyes off Him. Somehow Mary knows she is holding God. So, this is He. She remembers the words of the angel: "His kingdom will never end."

He looks like anything but a king. His face is prunish and red. His cry, though strong and healthy, is still the helpless and piercing cry of a baby. And He is absolutely dependent upon Mary for His well-being.

Majesty in the midst of the mundane. Holiness in the filth of sheep manure and sweat. Divinity entering the world on the floor of a stable, through the womb of a teenager and in the presence of a carpenter.

She touches the face of the infant-God.

The second is in a book entitled "In the Presence of God", ISBN 978-1-86920-659-8, by Izak de Villers. The romanticism of the birth in the stable is actually not as sadly sentimental as it is in our imagination or in paintings: depictions of sheaves of wheat piled high, a donkey and a cow. During busy times, clean stables

were often rented out as a place to stay overnight and it was in such a place that Mary had placed her Son. Milton sings in exultation "this is the Month, and this the happy morn/wherein the Son of Heaven's Eternal King...Our great redemption from above did bring; for so the holy sages did sing...' It is a beautiful poem in which jubilation, imagination and vision reach dizzy heights, up to the significant: 'But see the Virgin blest,/ Hath laid her Babe to rest/e is our tedious Song should here have ending (From On the Morning of Christ's activity).

It is no sin if one's imagination runs away with you over such a simple, profound, but heaven-shattering event. Parents sing songs of praise at the birth of their children, in itself a miracle surrounded by God. Therefore, let the candles burn and the songs resound. The Son of God came from the House of the poet king, David, in the neighborhood of his 'green pasture'. God came to reclaim His people who had been estranged from Him.

In front of me, against the wall, hangs a copy of a centuries-old Austrian altarpiece with a regal Mary, staring resolutely into the distance, and a little Boy on her arm Who turns His eyes towards the two angels watching over them. It is pure artistic imagination, but it touches me in an inexplicable way. It is as if Mary is looking far into the future, past the cross, into eternity. It is as if the little Baby already knows everything.

Sometimes artists succeed in capturing mystic truths that escape us in reality. Milton exults about thousands of worlds in God's Creation. Hopkins sees visions of the Virgin, the stable and the Child in the soft flowers of March and in the starry skies.

Christmas is jubilation, gratitude and remembrance. Christmas is Christ. Christmas is a star that started to twinkle in Bethlehem and keeps on twinkling until the Bright Morning Star comes again.

FINANCIAL SECRETARY'S REPORT - George Ferriso

Winter 2019 Jan, Feb, March

Let me start by wishing you and your families a belated Merry Christmas and a Happy & Healthy New Year.

In the last compass, I reported that Dues would be increased to \$60.00. Due to a technicality in the Council By-Laws, this has been rescinded and dues will remain, at least for this year, at \$40.00. You can pay for multiple years and the monies will be put into the systems as credits.

As for HONORARY MEMBERS dues will be \$10.80. State and Supreme councils have raised the stipend and Culture of Life Payments that our council pays by \$2.00 and we are allowed to raise your dues from \$8.80 to \$10.80 to cover these costs.

Paper invoices were mailed out in December UNLESS we have your email on file and your electronic invoice was emailed to that email address. Subject line: "Dues Notice for Council 1672". Please DO NOT DELETE this email and please check your email for the invoice. I received numerous notes from Brothers last year that they never received any electronic invoice. I sent each of those brothers a letter showing them the email and the email address we have on file. I ALSO requested a change of email address if necessary. Of all the notes I received, I only received I Brothers change of email. I am making the assumption that the information we have in the system is correct! Electronics saves the council a lot of money.

Please pay your dues **ASAP**. As I said before, the cost of time, paper, ink, envelopes and postage is considerable and if you do not pay the first invoice another one needs to be sent out. Despite all our

efforts, expenses continue to rise. NOTE: At the council meeting of November 8, 2016 a motion was passed to charge an administration fee to cover these expenses. Any dues paid after 1/31/19, the dues will be \$45.00 after 1/31/19. Should you receive a second invoice, you will see the administration fee added to the invoice. If paying late and the \$5.00 is not added to your payment, it will remain on your ledger as an accounts receivable.

Dues can be paid multiple ways: I) You can mail me the dues (361 Colgate Way, Freehold, NJ)

2) Drop them in the mail box in front of the council, attn.: George F. 3) I tend bar on meeting nights (2nd & 4th Tuesdays of the month) and you can give me your dues; (I will have all the traveling cards with me and hand you yours after payment. 4) Bring the dues to the lounge and give it to the bartender with my name on it; they will get the dues to me. IF you are having any kind of financial difficulty please DO NOT wait until the last minute to let us know. The council can and will help you. You do not need to tell us what the difficulty is, just that you are having issues that prevent you from paying your dues.

You all should be tired of hearing this - As always we are STILL missing or have incorrect phone numbers from a lot of members. Please notify me of a change of address, email or phone number.
